

Letter from Bishop Peter

The following letter from Bishop Peter, Bishop of Barking, was read out in our churches on Trinity Sunday, 11th June.

FTER SATURDAY EVENING'S horrific and senseless terrorist attack at London Bridge we continue to pray for those whose lives been devastated by injury and grief and we thank God for the bravery and skill of our police and medical services in the most demanding of circumstances.

I am very aware that after further security services raids and arrests in our area of East London this past week the times remain very unsettling and fearful for many in our churches and communities. Please pray for the communities we serve, especially in Barking, East Ham and Ilford, where such raids have taken place, and reach out to other faith and community leaders to stand strong and together against

these evil acts and any subsequent hate crimes or threats. I shall be doing so myself.

This is not a time to withdraw in fear or anxiety but to engage with the love and hope, reaching out to all whom we are called to serve together across East London and Essex. We of course need to do so with care and vigilance, helping overcome fear and suspicion.

Today is Trinity Sunday, which reminds us that our God lives and acts in loving community and unity. We need to do the same, praying for grace to do so. With my continuing prayers and good wishes, B

Bishop Stephen: Build a society on love not on the fear and threat of terror.

HERE IS ONLY one thing that you can't take away from a human being: that is our freedom to choose how we respond.
You can beat someone, starve them, abuse them, imprison them, deprive them of their freedom, and trample over their rights, but you can't make someone respond how you want them to respond unless they choose to; and on the contrary if they choose to respond with love, generosity and graciousness in the face of oppression, then there is nothing the oppressor can do about it.

We see this response of love in many different ways: people going to a concert in Manchester to declare 'one love' rather than cowering in their homes in fear; people reaching out to each other across boundaries of ethnicity, nationality, faith or class. Last week I witnessed it in the Holy Land. I was on pilgrimage to the great Christian sites but was also privileged to attend a talk by a Jewish man and a Palestinian Muslim. Both of them had lost a daughter to violence perpetrated by the other side. They had not chosen revenge. They had not chosen violence. They had not

retreated into a ghetto, cut off from those who were different from themselves. Despite their anguish, anger and grief they had made their response a response of love. They had reached out to each other, and gathering other bereaved parents together, committed themselves to work for justice and reconciliation in a divided land.

As we face the fear of terror and the threat of further terrorist atrocities, let our response be the same: let's reach out to each other; let's not give in to our baser instincts for vengeance. Instead, let's work for justice and peace. Those who perpetrate these atrocities want us to be divided and they want us to cower in fear. Let's not give them this satisfaction. Instead, let us carry on as normal. Yes, be vigilant. Yes, support our police and security services. Yes, seek justice. But most of all, let's not allow ourselves to be anything other than the peaceful, respectful, tolerant, society that terror is trying to undermine and which love and only love can build.



OWDY EVERYBODY. HOPE you are all well as you read this. I wanted to share with you all an outreach program that we are putting in motion. Myself and a few others want to have a week of crazy fun and outreach in the community. Starting the week of the 8th-13th August, we are going to have 2 days—ideally Tuesday 8th and Wednesday 9th—aimed at teenagers of ages 12 to 18 where we will have a host of activities over those 2 days. There will then be 2 days of really fun, interactive, exciting drama workshop based on the Disney film Moana led by our own Amy Insole, catered for the ages of 7 to 11 on 10th and 11th.

Saturday will be a really massive Messy Family Day aimed at families, children and young people in the community. This will be held in the church hall and car park. Sunday morning will also be used to invite the drama workshop team to come and perform the piece that they worked on with Amy during the 10:30am service at RPC and will be encouraged to invite their families to see the piece.

To give you more details. The Saturday will be the day that we really want all the church to get involved with. That Saturday will not be a YCM initiative it is a whole church body united initiative. We really want people to commit, to really get plugged in, to really be involved, to cook a whole variety of food—not just BBQ but food that really resonates and exemplifies with the culture, diversity and the breadth of people we have in RPC.

This will be a great time to show a united body in the community, getting alongside families, children, youth, playing FIFA and just interacting with the community. We want to do a messy church feel to it and those who have run messy church before really know how fun and impactful it can be.

We want to have craft tables activities inside the hall and interact with the children and families. We want to have a video games section upstairs being run and supervised by our FIFA Pastors (Niran and

Steven 9). We will also have music, possibly a bouncy castle depending on space (I can get carried away some times), bubble machines and refreshments. Outside we want to engage with families by having face painters, competitive sport such as 3 legged race, egg and spoon race, tug of war between mums and dads or parents and children. Really have a blast and some serious fun.

We are so excited for that week as it will be the first ever week of outreach since the Norwegians came. What fun and exciting way to really get involved with the community. So you see this is not just a YCM effort but a whole church effort. We can't do this on our own. We WANT and NEED you, CHURCH, to make this a possibility and reality. My China Experience!

Henrietta Akindele tells us all about her time in China.

life changed forever! I landed in Shenzhen, approximated 30mins away from Hong Kong. I spent the first 2 weeks living in a hotel, contacting agents to find my perfect apartment all whilst undergoing intense work training in the intense Shenzhen heat. It wasn't too long until I found my comfortable studio apartment in the city centre and got down to business.

I started my China experience as an ESL English Teacher working at an English Language Centre. God came through and opened doors for me that I did not even know were available and landed me a dance teaching opportunity, as well as a modelling contract, and the biggest blessing of them all was a newfound confidence and sense of self development that led me to be bold and network with both local and foreign professionals, leading me to work as a Medical English Consultant where I trained doctors and nurses in medical and conventional English at one of the most established hospitals in Shenzhen; Shenzhen 2nd People's Hospital.

This was great because for the longest time, I felt lost and uncertain about my career path, but God made a way and gave me an opportunity to truly tap into my potential and combine all of my biggest passions together. The blessings have just been flowing ever since and I will forever be grateful to God for that.

China is a lovely place and it is easy to judge a nation based on hearsay and media, but experiencing it for myself was an amazing opportunity. The number of Christians I came in contact with in China was amazing too, I found a couple of churches and a community to pray with. I arrived back in the UK a year later and intend to return to China towards the end of the year to continue God's plan for my life.

The Fruit of the Vine

T HAS OFTEN been said that the church is not an organisation but an organism. It grows organically not institutionally, because it is rooted in a relationship with God through Jesus Christ, empowered by His Holy Spirit. Jesus describes that relationship through the picture of the Vine and its branches. It is not just a picture but a symbol which has its roots in the Old Testament where God describes Israel as the Vine planted in God's vineyard in order to bear fruit that would bless the nations. Jesus then takes on that description as Himself. He is the Vine, the Israel called to fulfil God's purpose for reconciliation with humanity. We are described as branches on this Vine and therefore part of that continuing mission of God, not for Him but through Him.

This month we will explore what that means for us today planted here in this community; called to be fruit bearers; called to impact this place with His Kingdom—His vineyard. His desire is to fill His church with His glory and fill this community with His church.
